From the Desk of the School Nurse-Vision, Learning and the Importance of a Professional Eye Exam

Did you know:

80% of classroom learning is visual?

20% of students have a vision concern?

Undiagnosed and uncorrected vision problems can impact a student's school performance, both academic and behavioral

According to the American Optometric Association, the following vision skills are needed for effective reading and learning:

Visual acuity: the ability to see clearly in the distance for viewing the chalkboard, at an intermediate distance for the computer and up close for reading a book.

Eye focusing: the ability to accurately maintain clear vision as the distance from objects changes, such as when looking from the chalkboard to a paper on the desk and back. Eye focusing allows the student to maintain clear vision over time such as when reading a book or writing a report.

Eye tracking: the ability to keep the eyes focused when looking from one object to another, moving the eyes along a printed page or following a moving object like a thrown ball.

Eye teaming: the ability to coordinate and use both eyes together when moving the eyes along a printed page, and to be able to judge distances and see depth for classwork and sports.

Eye-hand coordination: the ability to use visual information to monitor and direct the hands when drawing a picture or trying to hit a ball.

Visual perception: the ability to organize images on a printed page into letters, words and ideas and to understand and remember what is read.

Symptoms of a possible vision issue include:

Complains of blurred vision

Rubs eyes frequently

Squints

Able to read for only a short time

Reading comprehension can be a challenge

Holds things very close.

Says eyes are tired

Has headaches when reading

From the Desk of the School Nurse continued:

Trouble visualizing what is being read

Difficulty spelling words correctly

Short attention span

A vision screening done in the school setting will not pick up many vision concerns as the vision screens are focused on distance vision. A comprehensive eye exam is a thorough exam done by an eye doctor, either an ophthalmologist or optometrist. The eye doctor can diagnose the student's medical or vision problem and provide treatment. If you receive a vision referral from your school nurse, or notice any of the above symptoms, it is important to contact your preferred eye doctor and schedule an appointment.
